



Pupil Premium Statement 2016 - 2017

What is pupil premium?

The Pupil Premium is allocated to schools with pupils on roll in January 2016 that are known to have been eligible for free school meals (FSM) at any time in the last six years. Each of these pupils will attract £1320 . Schools have the freedom to spend the Premium, which is additional to the underlying schools budget, in a way they think will best support the raising of attainment for the most vulnerable pupils. Parents/carers are urged to register their child as eligible for FSM so that each school receives their maximum Pupil Premium entitlement.

Pupil Premium is also provided for children in care who have been looked after continuously for at least six months and for children of parents in the armed services, who face particular challenges.

The amount for children eligible for FSM is £1320 per child and for Service children is £300.

Main barriers to educational achievement are :-

- Lack of aspiration amongst some Pupil Premium families
- Poor attendance among some Pupil Premium children
- Historical lack of a strategic overview of provision for Premium Children

Pupil Premium at Edenthorpe Hall Academy

In 2016-17 the school will receive a total of £66,740.



How the pupil premium money will be used:

- Breakfast club – free to children on FSM
- Developing a range of after school/ lunchtime clubs open to all but free of charge. For PP children
- Learning mentor who leads on attendance, working with families, PHSE and behaviour management.
- Nurture group
- Signposting opportunities for parents,/ carers
- Implementation of Read Write Inc literacy/phonics programme in small groups across FS2 and KS1 to achieve high level outcomes
- Implementation of Read Write Inc Fresh Start literacy to targeted KS2 children
- Provision of small group /1:1Sessions to close gaps
- A wide variety of opportunities to involve and engage parents/ carers in their children’s learning and development
- Offer of pastoral support to all children, particularly those which are most vulnerable through a range of exciting and interesting interventions and support programmes
- ‘Structured Conversation’ (Achievement for All) offered to parents/carers of SEND/ vulnerable children
- Strategic overstaffing by teachers to support small groups and provide one to one tuition
- 1:1 and small group provision of KS 1 and 2 Literacy and numeracy “catch up” and pre programmes
- 11 by 11 (things to do at Edenthorpe as part of the Reach 4 Promise)– programme of experiences whilst at school from F2to Y6
- ‘Aim High’ programme targeted at raising aspirations among higher achieving children attracting Pupil Premium funding.
